


The EUIPO Mediation Centre (EMC)

Established on 22 November 2023

Objective

To provide **complementary**, **voluntary**, **confidential** and accessible dispute resolution **options** to users so that they can **choose the most appropriate path** in the event of an IP dispute.





The EUIPO Mediation Centre (EMC)

Huge potential of ADR in inter-partes proceedings...

300,000 IP rights applications per year

200,000 EUTM; 100,000 RCD

24,500 disputes every year

20.000 oppositions; 2.000 cancellations; 2.500 appeals

ADR is effective

70% Settlement rate; 80% User satisfaction





Our services



Mediation

Reach an amicable settlement with the assistance of a mediator



Conciliation

The conciliator suggests possible solutions. Conciliator is always the rapporteur



Expert determination

In the context of a mediation, parties may appoint an expert to provide an opinion on a specific matter



Friendly settlement

Invitation to the parties to consider negotiating, without the intervention of a neutral




ADR case management and guidance

Case management team manages procedural aspects of the ADR processes, guides on suitable ADR mechanisms and facilitates contacts between parties

EU Mediation Directive – Scope

Scope

- Cross-border disputes in civil and commercial matters
- <u>Definition</u> of "cross-border dispute": dispute in which at least one of the parties is domiciled/habitually resident in a Member State other than the other party
- EU <u>definition</u> of "Mediation" and "Mediator"



EU Mediation Directive – Substantive rules

The Directive contains **five** substantive rules:

- MS shall encourage <u>the training of mediators</u> and to <u>ensure high quality of</u> <u>mediation</u>
- 2. Gives judges the right to invite the parties to a dispute to try mediation
- 3. Provides that <u>settlement agreements</u> can be rendered <u>enforceable</u> if both parties so request
- 4. Ensures that mediation takes place in an atmosphere of confidentiality
- 5. Guarantees that parties retain the **possibility to go to court**



EU Code of Conduct for Mediators

- Competent and knowledgeable
- To be appointed, mediator must have the <u>appropriate background</u>
- Promotion of their practice in a professional, truthful and dignified way
- The mediator must ensure that the <u>parties understand the process and the role</u> of the <u>mediator</u>
- Parties have <u>adequate opportunities</u> to be involved in the process, <u>fairness of the process</u>
- Agreement reached by the parties is through knowing and informed consent



Legal framework: EUTMR – CDIR – CRAFT GIs

- Facilitation of amicable settlement of disputes of EUTMR and CDIR based on mutual agreement
 Preamble 35 EUTMR, Art. 47(4) & 64(4) EUTMR, Art. 31(5) CDIR
- Provision of voluntary mediation services
 Article 151(3) EUTMR Tasks of the Office
- Establishment of the Mediation Centre Article 170 EUTMR
- Geographical indications for craft and industrial products
 Preamble 22, Article 25 (Oppositions) and Article 33 (Appeals)

Decision No ADM-23-45 on the Establishment and Operation of the Mediation Centre

SCOPE:

- the Centre offers voluntary mediation services to natural and legal persons for trademark and design disputes.
 - 1. Other IP disputes can be included by mutual agreement.
 - 2. Executive Director will nominate mediators.

ACTIVITIES:

- 1. Information and Training Sessions
- 2. ADR Awareness Promotion
- 3. Cooperation Management
- 4. IP Policy development
- 5. Assistance to Disputing Parties
- Mediators Coordination

- 7. Quality Assurance
- 8. Support for ADR Activities
- 9. Repository of Reports

STRUCTURE AND GOVERNANCE

Operated by the EUIPO Boards of Appeal Strategic Management by EMC Steering Committee: Executive Director, President of the BoA, Directors of the Operations, Legal and Customer Departments and the Head of the ADR (+ other staff upon invitation by the Executive Director).



Decision No EX-23-9 on the administration of mediation processes ("Rules on Mediation")

- Participants: one/more mediator(s) appointed by the parties
- Voluntary character
- Discussions and negotiations during mediation must remain **confidential for all parties** involved.
- Role of the mediator: assist parties in reaching a voluntary and mutual satisfactory settlement; if requested by the parties, the mediator may make proposals to resolve the dispute.
- **Equality and impartiality**: mediators will try to ensure that the parties have <u>equal opportunities</u> to participate and shall act with impartiality towards the parties.
- Conflicts of interests: mediators will not take part in any mediation concerning a case in which they have a) had any prior involvement; b) any personal interest; c) previously been a representative of one of the parties.
- The Office may propose mediation to the parties. Each party will have <u>2 moths</u> from notification to respond. Deadline can be extended once by 1 month.



Rules of Procedure of the Boards of Appeal (conciliation)

CHAPTER IV:

- Request for Conciliation: After submitting the statement of grounds either party can request conciliation; the other party has one month to respond.
- Conciliation Proposal: <u>following the Final Procedural Check</u>, the Rapporteur may propose conciliation, allowing parties **two months to agree or decline**.
- **Conclusion of Conciliation**: conciliation can conclude by agreement, decision of the Rapporteur, a party opting out, or expiration of the suspension period.
- **No liability**: The office and Rapporteur are not liable for the outcome or enforcement of any settlement agreements reached.



Mediation features

The EUIPO Mediation Centre offers alternative dispute resolution (ADR) services to all parties involved in **intellectual property disputes** pending before the EUIPO.



Eligible disputes at the EUIPO Mediation Centre

- Entry point: ongoing inter-partes disputes concerning
 - > EU trade marks and/or
 - Registered Community designs
- Adversarial proceeding fee paid
- Possibility to include in the ADR process:
 - Other IP rights (copyright, domain names, patents...) or any other related pending disputes
 - Disputes anywhere in the world
- Request: any time after opening of adversarial part of proceedings





2 Suspension of proceedings



For proceedings at the EUIPO:

 Joint request: automatic suspension Article 170(5) EUTMR




Unilateral request or Proposal from the EUIPO
 Proceedings will be suspended when mediation is accepted by other party

For proceedings NOT at the EUIPO:

Parties to request suspension to competent national authority Art 12(3) Rules on Mediation






- A safe, secure and confidential environment.

Roles during mediation phase

Mediation phase

Parties

- Decide the outcome
- Authority to decide on behalf of company
- Agree on follow-up actions
- Implement agreed actions

Lawyers

- Provide legal advice
- Draft settlement agreement
- Verify legal aspects


Mediator

- Guides process to reach agreement
- No legal advice
- Checks that keypoints and relevant clauses are included
- Not liable for outcome, legality / enforceability of settlement agreement

What to expect at the mediation session?





10 reasons why IP disputes may be suitable for mediation

- The dispute is still at an **early stage** of the conflict
- The parties are, or wish to be, engaged in a business venture

The dispute is **complex** or involves **several** jurisdictions

- **Confidentiality** is important for the dispute
- A court decision in the dispute would be **difficult to enforce**
- The parties want to preserve their business reputation
- The parties have, or may have, **co-existing IP rights** in the dispute
- A language barrier exists between the parties

A **tailored** approach is essential for the dispute

The parties want to resolve the dispute **quickly**



Our Mediators

The EMC counts on a team of internal qualified mediators from the Office who have undergone specialised mediation training with internationally recognised ADR training institutions.

EUIPO mediators are experienced in IP matters. They are all multilingual, allowing users a wide linguistic choice.

- Appointed mediators: 24
- Increasing capacity with new mediators: ongoing training and accreditation activities to reach a number of 30 mediators by the end of 2024
- The Mediator Engagement Plan includes training and communication activities, mock mediations, briefing sessions and coaching.



User Awareness, Stakeholder Engagement And Cooperation

- Over 20 events and educational webinars for IP practitioners with the support of stakeholders (national and regional IPOs, user associations, etc.)
- Joint Awareness campaigns on ADR for SMEs with national and regional IPOs (ECP6)
- Mediation Centre Stakeholders Network brings together representatives from IP user associations, bar associations at EU and international level, business associations, ADR centres and other relevant stakeholders.
- EUIPN: ECP6 subWorking Group on ADR –cooperation initiatives with EU
 Member States IPOs aimed at raising awareness and training .
- Network of IP judges of the EUTM and RCD courts on mediation strengthening the use of mediation in IP proceedings pending before national Courts.
- Bilateral cooperation activities with other stakeholders


